The Honorable Judith S. Kaye Children and the Law Committee Scholarship

The New York Bar Foundation is pleased to announce the **2017 The Honorable Judith S. Kaye Children** and the Law Committee Scholarship which has been established through a special project of the Committee on Children and the Law of The New York State Bar Association.

The scholarship will be awarded to three students who will age out or have aged out of foster care with a permanency goal of Another Planned Permanent Living Arrangement (APPLA) and are enrolled in an accredited undergraduate or post high school certificate program during the 2016-2017 academic year. Students must demonstrate a school-related financial need beyond tuition that is not being met by other sources.

The Honorable Judith S. Kaye Children and the Law Committee Scholarship

The scholarship, valued up to \$2,500, will be awarded to three (3) students enrolled on a full-time or part-time basis during the 2016-2017 academic year in an accredited undergraduate or post high school certificate program.

- 1. The scholarship recipient will be announced no later than December 31, 2016.
- The Children and the Law Committee Scholars will be selected by a committee convened by the Commission and including representatives from The New York Bar Foundation and the NYSBA Children and the Law Committee.

Eligibility

- 1. The scholarship is open to all students who will age out or have aged out of foster care in New York State with a permanency goal of APPLA and are enrolled in an accredited undergraduate or post high school certificate program during the 2016-2017 academic year.
- 2. Student must be under the age of 26 years.
- 3. Students must be in good standing (2.5 or equivalent GPA) or provide confirmation by a professor or instructor that demonstrates they are working to improve their standing.
- 4. Students must be New York State residents.
- 5. Students must demonstrate a school-related financial need that is not being met by another source.

Payment of Scholarship

The scholarship will support a school-related expense within the student's 2016-2017 academic year. A check will be made payable and mailed to the student no later than February 3, 2016.

Scholarship Application Requirements

The applicant must submit the following:

- 1. A completed application (application form below);
- 2. Unofficial transcript;
- 3. If GPA is below 2.5, a letter of recommendation from a professor or instructor demonstrating the student is working to improve his/her standing.

Deadline

All hard copy material submissions must be postmarked on or before Monday, December 5, 2016. All email submissions must be submitted by midnight, Monday, December 5, 2016.

Judging

Criteria for judging applications will be:

- 1. Content of application materials.
- 2. Demonstrated school-related need that is beyond student's resources.
- 3. Any other relevant factors.

Submission

About THE NEW YORK STATE PERMANENT JUDICIAL COMMISSION ON JUSTICE FOR CHILDREN

The New York State Permanent Judicial Commission on Justice for Children was established in 1988 by the then Chief Judge to improve the lives and life chances of children involved with New York courts. The Honorable Judith S. Kaye chaired the Commission for over 25 years. The Commission is now chaired by former Chief Administrative Judge A. Gail Prudenti; and its members include judges, lawyers, advocates, physicians, legislators, and state and local officials.

The Judith S. Kaye Scholarship was originally established by the New York State Permanent Judicial Commission on Justice for Children (Commission) at the request of the Kaye family to honor Former Chief Judge Judith S. Kaye's commitment to improve the lives and life chances of the children who come before the New York State Courts. The Honorable Judith S. Kaye chaired the Commission for over 25 years, first as an Associate Judge of the New York State Court of Appeals and continuing through her years as Chief Judge and while Of Counsel at Skadden, Arps, Slate, Meagher & Flom LLP and Affiliates after her mandatory retirement. The Honorable Judith S. Kaye Children and the Law Committee Scholarship is a special project authorized by the Children and the Law Committee of The New York State Bar Association and is administered through the New York Bar Foundation with funds generated by the PJCJC Fund, Inc. – a 501(c)(3) entity of the Commission established to further its mission to improve lives and life chances of children involved with New York State courts.

The Honorable Judith S. Kaye

For 25 years, three months and 19 days, Judith S. Kaye served as Judge of New York State's high court, the Court of Appeals, 15 of those years as Chief Judge of the State of New York. She was the first woman named to that bench. After her mandatory retirement, Judge Kaye joined Skadden, Arps, Slate, Meagher & Flom as Of Counsel in February 2009. Before her appointment, Judge Kaye was associated with Sullivan & Cromwell, IBM, and Olwine, Connelly, Chase, O'Donnell & Weyher, where she became that firm's first female partner. Her practice was essentially in the area of commercial litigation, supplemented by bar association and pro bono activities. She was a graduate of New York University School of Law (cum laude) and Barnard College.



Honorable Judith S. Kaye 1938-2016

Judge Kaye wrote notable decisions on a wide array of constitutional, statutory and common law issues. As Chief Judge she also left her mark on

New York's courts as a creative reformer, centering on improvement in the jury system, the Commercial Division of the State Supreme Court, creation of streamlining procedures for permanency for children, and opening "problem-solving courts" to deal constructively with repeat offenders, offering services for drug treatment, mental health counseling and job training. She was the author of more than 200 publications, including articles on legal process, state constitutional law, women in law and professional ethics.

Judge Kaye served on numerous Boards, including the Board of Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts, the American Arbitration Association, the Museum of Jewish Heritage, The International Institute for Conflict Prevention and Resolution ("CPR"), Volunteers of Legal Services and the Permanent Judicial Commission on Justice for Children. She also received numerous awards recognizing her judicial and scholarly accomplishments, such as the New York State Bar Association's Gold Medal, the ABA Justice Center's John Marshal Award, the National Center for State Courts' William H. Renhquist Award for Judicial Excellence, the American Bar Association Commission on Women in the Profession's Margaret Brent Women Lawyers of Achievement Award, and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Adoption Excellence Award.

Judge Kaye's many judicial accomplishments, landmark decisions and dissents, and glass ceiling breakthroughs are well documented. A substantial number of those accomplishments focused on the well-being of children and families. Judge Kaye's "passion," as she termed it, was her work to improve the lives of New York's children and families. Judge Kaye raised the stature of the "quintessentially important" Family Court by valuing the work of the judges, attorneys, court personnel and the myriad agencies and professionals that help families in times of crisis. Every time she had the opportunity to hear from young people themselves about their lives, their struggles, their dreams, she was invigorated – juiced – as she would say, with new determination to make a call, give a speech, convene a taskforce, travel across the state, any action that would open doors, change hearts and effect the change she knew we needed to make to truly improve the lives and life chances of New York's children. She chaired the New York State Permanent Judicial Commission on Justice for Children for over 25 years, first as an Associate Judge of the New York State Court of Appeals and continuing through her years as Chief Judge and while at Skadden after her mandatory retirement.
